Cindy Chew PhD, FESGAR is Clinical Professor, Director of Imaging and Anatomy at the University of Glasgow, Radiologist at the University Hospital Hairmyres and immediate Past President of the Scottish Radiological Society. She was the first ethnic minority (though not the first woman) radiologist to serve as President of the Scottish Radiological Society where she established the inaugural SRS-Mann International Visiting Professorship. Cindy is a leading physician educator – her research focuses on medical student education, patient safety and inclusive education. She was inaugural Diversity Champion, chaired the Members and Diversity Committee, established the Mentoring program and served two terms as the Standards Officer of British Society of Gastrointestinal and Abdominal Radiology. She was elected Honorary President of the MedChir Society which enabled her to work closely with medical students and is President Elect of the Royal Society of Medicine.



Erin Cooke, MD is a Professor of Radiology & VCE currently at the University of Colorado, previously serving as Vanderbilt Diagnostic Radiology Residency Program Director and Virginia Mason DR Residency Co-PD in Seattle. Currently in the CU MSK section, her practice has included abdominal imaging, neuroradiology and musculoskeletal imaging. Her academic interests have focused on education & arts integration into radiology, stemming from her background as a painter with a BA in Studio Art from Wake Forest where she graduated valedictorian prior to entering medical school at Baylor. Throughout her career, she has continued to paint & pursue her passion of running as a member of Marathon Maniacs (Maniac #15169), finishing 25 marathons as of 2025, including 13 Bostons. An active contributor to the AAR, APDR, ABR, and AC, she is a co-founder of the AAR Arts & Humanities in Radiology SIG and the APDR Wellness Works peer mentorship program.



Dr. Anne Darrow is an Assistant Professor (breast imaging) and Associate Chair of Outreach & Engagement for the Department of Radiology at UC Davis. She completed a fellowship in Breast Imaging at the University of Chicago and Diagnostic Radiology Residency at Cook County Hospital. She earned her MD at the University of Illinois at Chicago after a decade working as a wellness program director, educator and domestic violence counselor. She earned an MA in education at the University of Southern California and BA in Anthropology at the University of California at Berkeley.

Dr. Darrow has 2 children who are eleven years old, she and her spouse each carried one of them - at the same time! They love camping, kayaking and traveling. Dr. Darrow is the Chair of the IDEA committee of the Society of Breast Imaging. She is passionate about medical education, promoting health equity and advocating for underserved groups.



Isabelle De Kock is an abdominal radiologist at Ghent University Hospital in Belgium, specialising in gastrointestinal imaging and multidisciplinary collaboration in inflammatory bowel disease. When she started in academic radiology ten years ago, she had one clear ambition: to do research. However, she joined a team that was primarily clinically oriented. Rather than lowering her ambitions, she widened her horizon and built collaborations beyond her department with gastroenterologists and surgeons, laying the foundation for a multidisciplinary research team that continues to grow today.

A pivotal moment in her career was an ESGAR-ESOR fellowship at University College Hospital London (UK) in 2017, where she met a mentor whose influence continues to shape her professional development and leadership approach.

She currently serves on the ESGAR Executive and Research Committees, coordinates several international educational initiatives, and recently received the ESGAR Rising Star Award. She has

contributed to several international imaging guidelines and will soon take on her first lead role in an ESGAR–SAR guideline initiative.

Her future ambitions include expanding her research program and growing into strategic leadership roles within both ESGAR and her home institution.



Lori Deitte MD is Professor of Radiology, the Vice Chair of Education, and the VUMC Vice President for Continuous Professional Development. She graduated from the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire, majoring in mathematics and physics. She received her medical degree from the University of Wisconsin, where she also completed her radiology residency training and abdominal imaging fellowship. She then joined a small private practice group in Johnson City, TN.

Twelve years later she pivoted her career from private practice to academic radiology, first at the University of Florida and then at Vanderbilt University Medical Center. Her focus has been on developing the next generation of radiologists and leaders. She has mentored and coached over 130 physicians and other individuals in leadership development, performance, goal achievement, and optimizing personal and professional fulfillment. She has authored or co-authored more than 70 peer reviewed publications and given more than 160 invited regional, national, and international presentations. Additional interests include instructional design, Design Thinking, mentoring/sponsoring, and coaching.

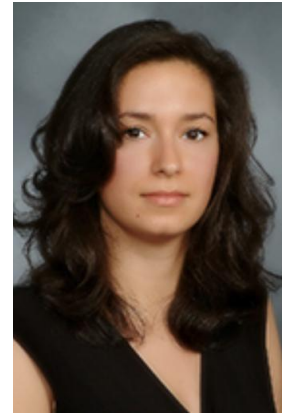

She currently serves as the Vice-President of the AAWR, as well as a Councilor to the ACR representing the state of Georgia. Outside of work, Dr. Kunjummen enjoys spending time with her husband, Binu and her three children.



Clarisse Lecluyse is an abdominal radiologist at Ghent University Hospital in Belgium, where she has worked for more than twelve years. Her work focuses on hepatobiliary and pancreatic imaging, combining clinical practice with teaching and involvement in research. She is also actively involved in mentoring medical students. Growing up as one of five sisters gave her an early sense of solidarity between women, something that continues to shape how she thinks about medicine and professional life. 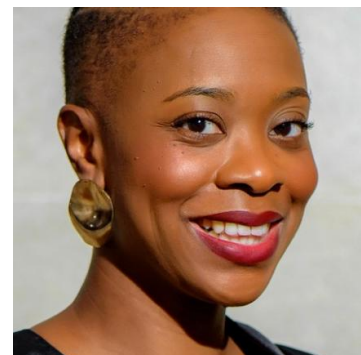

She is Director of BreastScreenWA and works at Sir Charles Gairdner and King Edward Memorial Hospitals and is an adjunct Associate

Professor at UWA. Emmeline is heavily involved with RANZCR as Lead Examiner in O&G Imaging, Foundational Chair of OGSIG, and a member of the Diversity, Equity and Inclusion taskforce; she was the 2023 Bill Hare Travelling Fellow. She is Radiopaedia's Expert Advisor for Obstetrics and serves on the Board of Directors of the Australasian Society of Ultrasound in Medicine. Her awards include the Professor Turab Chakera Award for Radiology Teaching (2015, 2025), ASUM Sonologist of the Year (2019) and a UWA Medical School Dean's Letter of Recommendation (2025). Dr Tammy Moey is a Senior Consultant and Head of Breast Imaging and Intervention at Singapore General Hospital. She has led efforts to improve timeliness of care, including streamlined diagnostic pathways and one-stop clinics for patients with suspected breast cancer, and has driven the clinical adoption of artificial intelligence as a second reader in mammography in her dept. She is also part of the evaluation committee for the adoption of AI in the national breast screening in Singapore.

national and European standards in CTC practice and she plays a leading role in shaping education and quality assurance in this field.

Anu is also co-founder of RadReach, a national initiative dedicated to widening participation in radiology and oncology by supporting aspiring clinicians from under represented backgrounds. She is passionate about creating more inclusive spaces in medicine and has delivered widely viewed talks on anti-racism, helping to open up honest conversations about equity and culture within healthcare.
